I Can't Thank the Hospice Enough for Caring for My Dad and Sister

My Sister, Liz

In December 2018, Chrissy Orson and her family received the devastating news that her sister Liz O'Donnell had bile duct cancer. Liz began chemotherapy, recovering initially but then the cancer sadly returned. Unfortunately, Liz's health deteriorated and our Hospice at Home and Caring Hands teams cared for her, supporting her husband, and their four children, in the comfort of their own home. On 8th February 2021, Liz sadly passed away at the age of just 47 surrounded by her family. Just after Liz's funeral, her dad, Brian, aged 78 was diagnosed with a tumour in his spine. Despite Chrissy's worst fears of losing her father too, she found comfort in knowing that her dad would receive the same amazing care from Dr Kershaw's that her sister, Liz, had received only a few short months ago. This is Chrissy's moving story about her experience of hospice care and how our Hospice helped her and her family...

"My sister married Chris, a Community Hub Leader, over 23 years ago and together they had four beautiful children; James (21), Catherine (19), Emilie (15) and Andrew (12). Liz worked as a Learning Support Manager at the Holy Cross College, Bury, since 2004, and had also been a School Governor with a passion for supporting students, many with physical and learning needs.

My sister was an amazing lady, with a lovely laugh, she was loved by so many. She loved taking her dog for a walk, camping holidays with the family and although she never considered herself to be a runner, she participated twice in the Oldham Hilly Half Marathon. For over 30 years, Liz helped to organise trips to Lourdes which were ran by her church, St. Edwards RC Church in Lees.

What Liz really appreciated was the way the team made her feel just like a 'normal' person despite her situation.



As part of my wedding preparations, Liz came with me to shop for bridesmaid dresses, during which she became very tired. She booked a doctor's appointment and was sent for tests, where a tumour was discovered in her bile duct. Immediately, Liz was taken into hospital for a high-risk procedure with only a 50 / 50 chance of survival. Thankfully all went well and Liz returned home where she belonged, starting chemotherapy. Liz even managed to attend my wedding, which we were both thrilled about, as it had looked doubtful for a while.

against Cancer,' a charity that was specific for people suffering with cancer to promote their

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The teams cared for Liz in such a way that they were not intrusive to our family, supporting us too.

Liz did recover initially, but in August 2020, we received the devastating news that her cancer had returned. Her health deteriorated and by January 2021, all treatment was withdrawn at which time she came under the care of Dr Kershaw's Hospice at Home Team and later, Caring Hands. The teams cared for Liz in such a way that they were not intrusive to our family. They supported us too, especially Liz's children, who never felt like they had to leave her side whilst her care was being provided.

What Liz really appreciated was the way the team made her feel just like a 'normal' person despite her situation and she formed a close bond with them. They kept her fully informed of the care they would be providing at all times and Liz thought the staff were wonderful.

Following her diagnosis, Liz was determined to raise funds for Dr Kershaw's who had supported her so much, as well as '5K Your Way: Move

My Dad, Brian

"Dad was a widower, after his wife who he had met at a local amateur dramatics group, died in 2009 of breast cancer. They had three daughters and six grandchildren; four of Liz's children and two of mine.

Dad was known as Mr. Social and loved spending time with his family and friends. He enjoyed going on holiday, classing Tenerife as his second home and he also visited Australia on a couple of occasions. Dad ran a family owned Plumbers' Merchants business, and before he became unwell he was very active, enjoying daily walks and lived independently, doing all his own shopping and driving.

Since 1966, assisted by family members including Liz, he had organised trips to Lourdes and he was heavily involved in the Catenian Association, a Roman Catholic lay society, of which he was a member. He assisted in all aspects of the Church, giving out books to parishioners, driving the priest to visit people to give them their last rites, even driving people who needed transport to go shopping or attend appointments.

After my sister, Liz's funeral, dad was sadly diagnosed with a tumour in his spine. At the time of Liz's funeral we were unaware, but he did have pain, meaning he had to attend in a wheelchair. As a result of his spinal condition, dad was partially paralysed, and was treated in hospital, with the team suggesting for him to go into 24-hour residential care but dad wanted to be treated at home, around family.

On his release home, we were delighted to hear that dad would be under the care of Caring Hands and Hospice at Home who had provided

such wonderful care to my sister, Liz, as well as supporting our family.

Dad was frightened, but his fears were alleviated by the Caring Hands Team visiting him four times a day. We can't praise Caring Hands enough for the way they treated dad, maintaining his dignity at all times. When he had difficulty eating they would manage to coax him to eat; much to our relief. They would change their times to attend to him in line with his wishes and were always very sociable and so kind with him. They were wonderful and Dad really bonded with the team and enjoyed their company.

The Hospice at Home Team's support was invaluable, their reassuring presence at all times was a great comfort.

As his condition deteriorated the Hospice at Home Team were brought in. We found their support invaluable, assisting members of the family on how to handle certain medications and even explaining what to do with certain documentation, their reassuring presence at all times was a great comfort.

When dad sadly passed away just six weeks after Liz, the team allowed his sister, Pat, to assist with the washing of his body and changing his clothes, which meant a great deal to her. She was visiting from Ireland, and it was so important to her to be able to assist in this way. As with Liz, all donations at dad's funeral went to support Dr Kershaw's, who have supported our family so much.

We are so grateful to Dr Kershaw's and can't thank the Hospice enough for the way they supported my sister, dad, and our entire family, enabling them both to be cared for in their own homes, and for us to be able to spend precious time with each of them."

60 Seconds with... End-of-Life Nurse Educator, Sarah Longmore





Sarah has been working at the Hospice for almost 18 months, and supports our dedicated Nursing Team by ensuring they have access to the latest clinical and hospice care training to enable them to provide outstanding care for our patients...

Why did you apply to work at Dr Kershaw's?

My mum and dad live just around the corner, and I've always thought it would be a lovely place to work. Before I had my children, I worked unsociable hours on the Intensive Care Unit. I wanted to move to a role in education and training and this role was perfect for me, even offering part-time hours to support my family life too!

Give us an overview of your role?

I am responsible for the education and training, primarily of the Clinical Team at the Hospice, but also support with the mandatory training of all Hospice staff. Within my role, I highlight ways to develop and improve practice, providing management and training on less routinely used clinical skills to embed confidence within the team. For example, I often support nurses who are new to the Hospice by making sure they are familiar with medication management and the syringe driver for patients.

What are the challenges of your role?

Clinical practices are always developing so we are continually developing our training for the Clinical Team. Also, when training is taking place it often highlights another training need which can be a snowball effect, meaning more training is required.

What are the rewards of your role?

Having the opportunity to improve practice and patient care, as well as supporting the team to develop personally and professionally and seeing the sense of achievement amongst the team once they have completed their training successfully. It's a lovely thing to be a part of!

What is your favourite thing about working at the Hospice?

The variation, every day is different. My job gives me the opportunity to be creative and to have a key role in developing hospice care and building skills within the incredible team that we have at Dr Kershaw's.
